Police use inmates to save on jail construction costs

Broomfield Police are currently using inmate workers on the Detention Center construction project and estimating a cost savings from using the inmate workers of about \$40,000 on the detention equipment contract which includes construction of cells, showers, doors, and cameras.



Inmate duties range from clean-up on the site to assisting with the construction of the cells in the detention expansion. They work from 7:30 a.m. until 3:30 p.m., Monday through Thursday.

The inmates are supervised by an officer at all times for security and job safety. Inmate workers receive a total of 12 days of good time off their sentence per month. Their sentences generally range from 30 days to 6 months, and they can not have any pending charges, warrants,

holds by other agencies or protection orders against them. These inmates have been sentenced for misdemeanor charges, generally theft, check fraud, DUI, etc.

To qualify for Inmate Worker status, they cannot be charged or have history of any crimes of violence, sexual offenses, escapes, or other serious offenses or attempts. They cannot be sick or have contagious diseases,

In addition, they must have exemplary institutional history at the Broomfield facility and at any previous. They also must have a medical exam to clear them to work.

Bay will open early this spring

Because both Adams County and Boulder Valley schools dismiss before Memorial Day this year, the Bay will open on Friday, May 28 instead of the customary "Saturday before Memorial Day" opening on May 29. With the schools dismissing early, life guarding staff will be available to offer this extra day to the community for the summer 2010 season.

Community Center pool closed for repairs; more closures set

The Broomfield Community Center pool was closed March 22 to 28 for maintenance. During the week, maintenance included: grate and pump work, installation of emergency shut offs for the

pumps, change over from all the old pool mechanical equipment to the new equipment - boiler, pumps, filter, and chemical automation.

Staff power washed all decks, walls, and the pool, re-painted decks and various spaces in the pool area and repaired the rope swing. They put up new kites on ceiling, cleaned lights, cleaned out all storage areas and repaired the vinyl liner.

Also during the closure, tiles in the locker rooms were replaced or repaired, and they deep cleaned showers and vents, and applied anti-slip application to floors in the locker rooms.

Utilities helped drain the pool and fill it back up.

More closures for maintenance are scheduled. Renovations on the Skate Park are scheduled to begin April 1, weather permitting. The targeted reopen date for the park is the first week of June.

The indoor playground at the Paul Derda Recreation Center will be closed April 1 to 4 for repairs.

The date for the annual maintenance closure at the Paul Derda Recreation Center is August 23 to 29. During that time, the Broomfield Community Center and the Broomfield Bay will remain open.

Bob Davis recognized for service to Land Use Review Commission

Land Use Review Commissioner Bob Davis was recognized with a plaque and praise for his service at his final meeting on Monday, March 8. Davis, who has served on the Land Use Review Commission (LURC) since December of 1997, has decided to retire.

LURC Chairman Tom Silvers noted that Davis dedicated himself to ensuring the City and County of Broomfield "always met the highest standards and giving the citizens of Broomfield every chance to be heard."

Among the proposals Davis heard during his tenure were the final phase of the Interlocken Development, Flatiron Crossing mall, Main Street at Flatirons, Flatiron Market Place, the Broadlands, and Aspen Creek. He considered developments for Sun Microsystems, Level3, and Ball when they moved to Broomfield.

Davis was involved in creating the 2005 Broomfield Comprehensive Plan, and reviewed the Omni Interlocken Hotel and Golf Resort Preble Creek, Anthem, Highway 7 and Interstate 25 developments, the Broomfield Library, Detention Center and Courthouse complex plans.

He considered two Walmarts, Broomfield Commons, Arista, Children's Hospital, and the Civic Center Master Plan.

Davis was also involved in taking Broomfield from a City to a combined City and County, and participated in the statewide campaign.

"This man has helped changed Broomfield from a sleepy little city of 25,000 to more than doubling in size with all of the right moves. His first love was keeping the Broomfield "Hometown" feeling," Silvers said. He thanked Davis for all of his time, guidance, and expertise through the years. "He will be missed," Silvers concluded.

Sustainability task force takes public comment at open house

Broomfield's Sustainable Community Task Force met with the public during an open house on March 15 at the Broomfield Community Center.

Preliminary draft goals policies and action steps developed by the Task Force were displayed for public review and comment. Approximately 50 residents and Task Force members attended and discussed sustainability recommendations for resource conservation, energy efficiency and alternative energy, economic development, transportation, and community education.

These comments will be discussed at the April 12 Task Force meeting.

Last spring, City Council charged the Task Force with updating the Environmental Stewardship Chapter of Broomfield's 2005 Comprehensive

Plan. The Task Force has been meeting monthly for the last year.

Looking ahead

Plan now for Spring Cleanup and Household Hazardous Waste Day

Spring is here and it's time to plan for the city's popular Spring Clean up program. Broomfield will again provide one-day-only curbside pickup of all large non-hazardous items, free.

Western Disposal Services has been contracted to pick up large unusable items from Broomfield residents' curbs on one of the three designated Saturdays, which are April 24, May 1 or 8. Maps will be published in the *Broomfield Enterprise* and shown on the city's Web site and Channel 8 to show the designated pickup day for the areas of the city.

All Spring Cleanup items must be placed at the curb no later than 7 a.m. on the designated Saturday. The contractor will not return to a neighborhood for items placed out after 7 a.m. Western Disposal will sort and recycle scrap metal, unpainted and untreated wood items, and electronic waste from the discards collected. All other items collected will be disposed of as garbage in the solid waste landfill.

The Rotary Clubs of Broomfield and ARC will pick up reusable donations. Marked reusable items such as used clothing, household goods and useable furniture should be placed in a separate location near the front door or porch. Call ARC at 303.238.5263 for reusable item donation information and leave your address with the answering service. Donations should be marked "ARC." A tax deductible donation receipt will be left at the front door. Donors are asked to call before noon on the Thursday before their assigned spring cleanup day.

Household Hazardous Waste Day is scheduled for Saturday, May 8 – by appointment only. To make an appointment, call 303.438.6334. Residents are asked to deliver their household hazardous waste items to the Norman Smith Municipal Service Center, 3001 W. 124th Ave.

A list of accepted items will be published in the *Broomfield Enterprise* and posted on the city's Web site and Channel 8. This event is for Broomfield residents only. Proof of residency is required to drop offwastes. Examples are driver's license, voter identification, tax certificate, or lease agreement.

Capital projects ...

Broomfield Community Center Boiler and Pump Room Replacement

City Council approved the construction agreement with Saunders Construction in October, 2009. The contractor immediately attempted to begin work but after calling for utility locates, a major Xcel Energy



electrical distribution line was discovered that was in conflict with the expansion. The electrical line was not located where indicated on existing Xcel Energy maps. The project was put on hold until Xcel Energy could relocate the electrical line.

Xcel's relocation work was substantially complete on Jan. 8, 2010, and work on the mechanical room expansion began again on Jan. 11. The building addition is almost complete.

The contractor is completing the metal roof, installing mechanical equipment, and grading for a new sidewalk and landscape repair. Conversion to the new boiler and mechanical equipment will require a week shut-down of the pool. This was scheduled for spring break beginning March 21.

Detention Center Expansion

City Council approved the Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) agreement with Haselden Construction for the construction of the Broomfield Police Department Detention Center Expansion in July, 2009. The work includes a 3,600 square-foot addition to the administration area of the building, a 23,000 square-foot

addition to the detention housing area, and approximately 10,000 square feet of remodel to the existing facility. The overall project is proceeding slightly ahead of schedule.

The administration addition, which includes office areas on the upper floor and staff locker rooms on the lower floor, is nearing completion. The contractor anticipates that staff can move into the new administration area the first week of April.

The contractor is installing mechanical, electrical and plumbing systems in the detention/housing addition. The contractor is also assembling jail cells and installing windows.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

Workforce Center - The Broomfield Workforce Center recently kicked off the 2010 Governor's

Summer Job Hunt with the annual Youth Job and Resource Fair at the 1STBANK Center. Over 40 employers and resource booths were there including the City and County of Broomfield, Water World, Elitch Gardens, King Soopers, Home Depot, Lowes, Dish Network, and T-Mobile among others. The event was targeted to youth between the ages of 15 and 21. For many, this was their first experience to talk directly with employers in a job fair atmosphere.

POLICE

The annual Neighborhood Watch Block Captain training, this year on March 3, is conducted as an integral part of the program. The training brought about 30 block captains out and featured a panel of experts from the Police Department to provide information and address questions and concerns. The program was the result of prior feedback from the block captains.

Topics discussed included the current crime statistics for 2009, burglary prevention, home security, identity theft, internet safety and sexting, traffic enforcement, solicitors, sex offender registry, and 91-1. The importance of each and every citizen taking an active part in crime prevention was also emphasized.

The commitment and participation of this group is a great example of the activities that community policing via the Neighborhood Watch program brings to a supportive and involved community.

RECREATION SERVICES

Active Adult – Broomfield's Senior Population showed extensive activity levels in the last month.

- Ten seniors participated in a snowshoeing trip to Eldora Mountain on Feb. 24 and unanimously agreed that this is something they want to do several times next year.
- The SilverSneakers® and Prime Membership participations remain strong and steadily growing. This represents seniors in Broomfield who consistently work hard to stay as active and healthy as possible.
- The Senior Wellness Conference at the Broomfield Community Center on Feb. 26 had 70 participants and 23 vendors. Recreation staff served at the luncheon which was part of the event.
- The Healthy Hearts Walking Program has 72 regular participants that "Walk Across America" figuratively as they walk the track together after a warm-up, Tuesdays and

Thursdays at the Paul Derda Recreation Center. Progress is marked each day on a map displayed at PDRC. They continue twice a week until March 25, at which time they will celebrate their success with a party!

Athletics – The Gymnastics program is busting its seams, with 1,040 participants currently enrolled. Of that number, there are 188 girls and 9 boys signed up to compete in CARA Gymnastics competition this year.

- The Broomfield Youth Basketball program is finishing up its active Winter season. This year, Sill-TerHar Motors, Inc., made it possible for participants and their parents, to attend two CU Men's and two Women's Basketball games. Sill-TerHar awarded each participant with one complementary ticket, and additional tickets were available to parents for \$1 each at the ticket office the night of the games.
